## Join Us for a Wreaths Across America Ceremony

Noon on Saturday, December 12, 2015 At The New Britain Baptist Church Cemetery

Wreaths Across America is a nationwide program to remember and honor our fallen heroes by placing holiday wreaths on the graves of Veterans laid to rest in cemeteries across the United States. Each year their mission, Remember, Honor, Teach, is carried out in part by coordinating wreath laying ceremonies on a specified Saturday in December at cemeteries and other locations in all 50 states and beyond simultaneously.

The New Britain Borough Historic Preservation is proud to sponsor Wreaths Across America again this year. At noon on Saturday, December 12, 2015, we will gather to honor Veterans buried in The New Britain Baptist Church Cemetery by placing wreaths on their graves in this historic cemetery. There are about 76 Veterans buried there many of whom are long gone, but never forgotten; 2 from colonial wars, 33 from the Revolutionary War, 13 from the War of 1812, 1 from the Mexican war, and 27 from the Civil War.

You can help honor these veterans by donating wreaths, they are only \$15 per wreath and your donation is tax deductible. Donations should be received by Monday, November 23. Please make checks payable to *Wreaths Across America* and send to the New Britain Borough office at 45 Keeley Avenue, New Britain, PA 18901.

## A Strategic Plan for the Nature Preserve

Last spring, the Borough's Nature Preserve Committee drafted a Strategic Plan for the Borough's Wilma Quinlan Nature Preserve. This plan is intended to establish our priorities, focus our energy and resources, and ensure we are all working towards common goals when it comes to the management and stewardship of the Preserve. The plan was presented to Borough Council for its approval in April and was approved by a 7-0 vote.

The Strategic Plan is based on the belief that we are our generation's stewards of the Preserve and that, in that capacity, we have an obligation to past, present, and future borough residents to continue the conservation efforts of those community leaders who decided this land was worth preserving almost a half century ago.

Our Strategic Plan is based largely on the Stewardship Plan prepared by Natural Lands Trust in 2008 and NLT's 2014 Addendum to that plan. It outlines our environmental and ecological, as well as recreational, priorities for the Preserve.

Much of the Strategic Plan focuses on the restoration of healthy wildlife habitat in the Preserve. A visit to the Preserve today shows that work in progress. Several acres of the Preserve have already been cleared of the invasive vines and shrubs that were growing there so that the area can be replanted with native trees and shrubs over the next year or so. The first of these trees, eastern white pines, are scheduled to be planted this month.



### Bird Town Committee Partners with Pine Run Elementary

This past spring the Borough's Bird Town Committee helped Pine Run Elementary School's third grade create a butterfly garden. They identified plants in the garden, and selected pollinators and host plants for the butterflies that the third graders raised. ## Moments with the Mayor

### **Civility & Honesty**

Between January and June of this year, New Britain Borough recorded more Backyard Habitat registrations than any other Bird Town in Pennsylvania and only one other Bird Town in the state had more people taking the Healthy Yard Pledge! If you haven't yet registered your own property or taken the Healthy Yard Pledge, please consider doing so now. By join-



ing the PA Audubon Bird Habitat network, you are demonstrating a commitment to create a bird habitat at your home or place of business.

By taking the Healthy Yard Pledge you are pledging to plant more native plants, remove invasive plants, reduce stormwater runoff, and eliminate the use of pesticides on your property. Fall is a great time to plant native trees and shrubs in your landscape, so please take the pledge now!

Registering your property only costs \$20.00 and you'll receive a yard sign to display. Taking the Healthy Yard Pledge is free. You can do both on line (go to http://pa.audubon.org/bird-habitat-recognition-program to print out a registration form) or you can pick up an application card during business hours at the borough office.

## Public Safety Committee

The New Britain Borough Public Safety Committee would like to remind all residents that some public streets in the Borough are posted as **"NO PARK-ING"** for safety reasons. Tickets may be issued for failure to observe the "no parking" restrictions.

The Borough website has a form for residents to report a traffic problem or concern. Residents can locate this form under **DEPARTMENTS – ROADS**. It may be used to report an observed hazardous driving episode such as frequent speeding, drivers running stop signs, general safety issues or traffic volume. Complaints will be reviewed and investigated.

## Halloween Safety

- Teach children to stop only at well-lit houses and to never enter a stranger's home.
- Instruct children not to eat any treat until they return home and treats are inspected.

### The Building in the Park

Early in September, volunteers will demolish the 'Summer Camp Building' in Covered Bridge Park. It was originally built as a motel unit, probably in 1920/1930, and was moved to the Park around 1960, but age has taken its toll.

The new building will replace the two sheds and be about the same size, 550 square feet, and closely resemble the historic old New Britain Train station, which was one of the more picturesque train stations designed by Frank Furness about 1890.



The new building will be permanent, properly footed and outfitted. It will have all of the architectural detail of the old one, thanks to architect Joseph Plummer and nine woodworkers who will create period architectural details.

If you wish to volunteer, we need help in framing, finishing, painting, and general construction. The construction schedule is for the foundation to be done by the end of September, erection in October, and 90% completion by November.



## Protecting our Water Resources

#### **STREAM PROTECTION:**

Limit use of herbicides and fertilizers. Dispose of hazardous materials such as oil, paint, medications, etc. to a hazardous waste drop-offs, never flush or dump. Maintain your vehicle by checking and repairing oil and antifreeze leaks. Any illegal dumping or drainage activities should be reported immediately to New Britain Borough. If you notice any signs of stream pollution or have any questions notify the Borough at 215-348-4586.

#### **RAINWATER RUNOFF:**

Consider reducing runoff to help your downstream neighbors by installing rain barrels on your downspouts, lowered planting beds (rain garden), connecting roof drains to stone pits, etc. These methods provide ground water infiltration.

### **POOL WATER DISCHARGE:**

Pool owners are required to dispose of water properly. Waste water containing chemicals such as chlorine and muriatic acid must be neutralized prior to disposal. Filter backwash should also be discharged to a grassy area and never to a street, pond or stream, or toward your neighbor's property. If you have any questions, please contact the Borough.

#### **CONSTRUCTION:**

Stormwater controls are required for most additions of impervious surfaces, which may require permits. Please check with the Borough office to determine if permits are required.

## Right-of-way Maintenance

Please trim vegetation within the right of way which may obstruct sidewalks (8' over sidewalks) or street signs. Dispose of vegetation properly. Do not allow leaves to block storm sewers or drainage ditches, direct grass clippings back toward your yard, not into the street, as they will contaminate streams with residual fertilizers. Any sidewalk, curbing or driveway aprons which have settled create tripping hazards, please correct these as soon as possible, as the Borough will be conducting inspections of these items and issuing property maintenance violation letters for any displacement greater than  $\frac{1}{2}$ ". We appreciate these items being corrected as soon as possible as any items corrected prior to these inspections will save the Borough time and money.


## **Road Work Scheduled**

Road work consists of crack sealing (to keep the water out), slurry seal ( to revitalize oxidized pavement and add a thin durable surfact), and mill and paving select areas/patches (to repair damaged pavement surfaces. The following streets are scheduled for work this year:

Crack seal: Birch, Cherokee, Iroquois (cul-de-sasc), Pawnee, Pueblo, Woodland (westerly portion).

Slurry seal: Algonquin, Cedar (Butler to Vine), Hawk (culde-sac), Mohawk and Spring Lake Drive.

More or less road work may be performed depending upon construction costs.
