#### **Bruce Burkart Donates to BCHS**

New Britain Borough historian and long-time Bucks County Historical Society volunteer Bruce Burkart contributed two musical instruments, a trumpet and a bassoon to the BCHS collection. At the age of six (about 1937-38), Bruce received the trumpet, which he played in his elementary school band. The trumpet bears the mark of "Fred Gretsch," an instrument maker and importer in Brook-



lyn, New York. Bruce played the instrument through about 1943-44, practicing and performing with the local high school band even though he was only in grade school at the time. In 1943, since there was no bassoonist in the band and orchestra, the band's director obtained a used bassoon for Bruce. The instrument actually dates to about 1913 and bears the stamp of the U.S. Quartermaster. It may originally have been used in a Marine Corps Band. Bruce played the bassoon in the North Wales marching band and in the Lansdale Symphony Orchestra for a few years, participating in concerts around the area.



Ambrose Randa started his business in 1964 with a background in new home construction and cabinet making. In 1967 he purchased one acre of industrial land in New Britain where he constructed his own woodworking building. He began making cabinets, wide plank flooring and other items out of hardwoods. His current business consists of kiln dried native and foreign hardwoods milled or rough, component parts, mantles, countertops, handcrafted unique plank flooring, natural free form tops, molding and many other custom made items.

Mr. Randa handcrafts wide planked wood for floors, which can range from 6 to 24 inches wide. These floors require no sanding so they will be ready for installation immediately. Wide planked floors are available in ash birch, maple, walnut, pine, cedar, red & white oak, cherry, poplar, mahogany, teak, rosewood and pearly & birds eye maple. These woods are also available for other items he makes. In addition, he crafts customized hardwood islands for kitchens, which are always constructed from solid wood and can be as wide as 5 feet and as long as 16 feet. He also creates beautiful mantles to surround the fireplace in your home. He offers a wide variety of Kiln Dried Hardwood lumber cut and sized to order.

Mr. Randa kept expanding his business by purchasing various types of equipment so that he can offer the finest quality products. In 1975 he purchased an Irvington Moore steam dry kiln and constructed the chamber. In 1997 he began offering kiln-dried hardwoods in various thicknesses, widths, and lengths in rough cut and milled to specs. In 2000 he purchased and installed a 42-inch capacity slant head band sawmill for specialty cutting of logs.

# Right-of-Way Maintenance

Please make sure that all vegetation is trimmed 8' over sidewalks or street signs to keep the view unobstructed.

Level or replace sidewalk, curbing or driveway apron, which have settled and could create tripping hazards.

Make sure mailboxes are set the proper distance from the curb/road line so they are not affected by plows this winter. Mailboxes must be positioned 6-8" back from the face of curb/edge of road and the top of the mailbox must be 42-46" above the lawn surface. No part of the structure may extend closer than 6" from the face of curb/edge of road.

The commemorative event will be held in conjunction with the Department of Defense as part of a nationwide tribute to Vietnam veterans. A special Vietnam veterans' lapel pin has been produced as part of the program and will be distributed to attending veterans and widows of Vietnam veterans.

"The heroes who served during Vietnam faced incredible dangers," McIlhinney said. "In many cases, returning veterans were not given the respect they deserved following their service. I am hopeful that these events will serve as a reminder that their efforts are deeply appreciated."

In order to be recognized at the event and receive the commemorative pin, a recipient must be a United States military veteran who served on active duty at any time during the period of November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of stationing location.

# **Borough Walkability**

New Britain Borough has been working towards a walkable Borough for years by requiring developers to install short sections of sidewalk across their property frontages. With the help of a state grant it was possible this summer to connect several sections of sidewalk together on the north side of Butler Avenue, from Pine Run Elementary School to Almshouse Road. The western portion of the Borough is now linked to Chalfont.

Doylestown Township constructed a section of Bike and Hike Trail along Keeley Avenue which connects to the Covered Bridge Park, the new pedestrian bike trail across Pine Run and also to Pine Run Dam/Iron Hill/Sandy Ridge Roads.

Next year we will be constructing a path from the intersection of Butler and Tamenend avenues to the New Britain Train Station, which will also connect to a future Doylestown Township trail.

Take a walk on the sidewalks and walk or bike on the bike and hike trails to experience the borough from a new perspective.

#### Doug Tallamy to Speak at Del Val

Anyone involved in the Bird Town program is familiar with the work of Doug Tallamy, professor and chair of the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware. Dr. Tallamy's 2007 book, *Bringing Nature Home*, provides the rationale behind the use of native plants to sustain native insects, birds, and other wildlife in one's own back yard. This is exactly what



the Bird Town program encourages property owners to do.

Dr. Tallamy will be speaking on the topic of "Restoring Nature's Relationships" on **Thursday, October 27 at 6:00 p.m.** in the Life Sciences Building auditorium at Delaware Valley University. # Bristol Road Extension

As was previously reported in this newsletter, a few months ago Borough Council passed a resolution in support of the construction of the Bristol Road Extension (BRE). New Britain Township and Chalfont Borough passed a similar resolution supporting the BRE. The three municipalities had all agreed to jointly fund a feasibility study to determine an updated cost for the project, however PennDOT said they would prepare the study.

The BRE would provide a much needed alternative means for traffic traveling northwest/southeast through the adjoining communities thereby easing traffic congestion along Business Route 202 and 152, which would benefit motorists and residents and reduce air pollution caused by current congestion. The BRE may reduce response times for our police, fire and EMT services and help reduce the wear and tear on our Pine Valley Covered Bridge.

Council voted four to three to do additional research with particular attention to the costs because they thought that they and the residents didn't have all of the necessary facts to make an informed decision.

## Be Kind to the Environment

#### **Stream Protection**

Limit use of herbicides and fertilizers. Dispose of hazardous materials such as oil, paint, medications, etc. in hazardous waste drop-offs, never flush or dump. Maintain your vehicle by checking and repairing oil and antifreeze leaks. Any illegal dumping or drainage activities should be reported immediately to New Britain Borough. If you notice any signs of stream pollution or have any questions notify the Borough at 215-348-4586.

#### Rain Water Runoff

Consider reducing runoff to help your downstream neighbors by installing rain barrels on your downspouts, lowered planting beds (rain garden), connecting roof drains to stone pits, etc. These methods provide ground water infiltration.

#### **Pool Water Discharge**

Pool owners are required to dispose of water properly. Waste water containing chemicals such as chlorine and muriatic acid must be neutralized prior to disposal. Filter backwash should also be discharged to a grassy area and never to a street, pond or stream, or toward your neighbor's property. If you have any questions, please contact the Borough.

#### Construction

Stormwater controls are required for most additions of impervious surfaces, which may require permits. Please check with the Borough office to determine if permits are required.
