

Planning for the Future

For the past two and a half years the Borough's Community and Business Committee (CBC), has been working on ways to improve and revitalize the Borough. We've engaged in community visioning and outreach to the residents and businesses through town hall meetings and a business survey. Land use and market assessments have led to the development of strategic themes and the foundation for a vision. Community partners, such as local businesses, residents, Delaware Valley College, and the Bucks County Planning Commission have been engaged in setting a positive direction for future planning and improvements. Delaware Valley College students, through a class in landscape architecture, with the assistance of their professors, have worked with the Borough on design concepts for Butler Avenue.

The Borough's Planning Commission has been working to update the Comprehensive Plan and is studying possible zoning changes along the Butler Avenue corridor to encourage the types of development desired by the community.

The project is part of comprehensive planning for the Borough and is part of Bucks County's Municipal Economic Development Initiative, which New Britain Borough was among the first to sign up with Bucks County.

In the beginning of this year the Borough hired Stephen Barth, an economic development consultant, to assist in revitalizing the community. He has actively been working with developers, investors and business owners. Some accomplishments thus far have been the formation of a Regional Joint Planning Commission that includes New Britain Borough, Doylestown Township, Bucks County and Delaware Valley College. The purpose of this group is to work collaboratively for the benefit of the communities and the College. The College is finalizing its Master Plan and anticipates achieving university status this year, which will positively impact the surrounding communities.

Mr. Barth has been meeting with the Borough's largest employers to help assist them and create a unified relationship within New Britain that benefits residents and businesses. The Borough's companies pay a large part of the Borough's tax base and benefit the community by providing jobs and revenue.

Other strategic projects have looked at the Shady Retreat Road and Butler Avenue intersection to propose the development of a small mixed-use village complex to support the community and the College. Additional ideas include improving the corridor along Butler Avenue on both sides of the College to make it look and feel like a college community by way of creating pathways, lighting and branded signage.

These are just a few of the things the Community and Business Committee, Bucks County, and Borough officials are doing to improve our community. We are very excited about the future of New Britain Borough.



Summer in Our Nature Preserve

If you haven't been to the New Britain Nature Preserve, you have no excuse. The Borough has preserved nearly 30-acres along Neshaminy Creek and Miriam's Meadow; a 1.5-acre cultivated wild flower meadow on Landis Mill Road. The main Preserve is a lovely walk in the woods and fields, but in the summer Miriam's meadow is a gem. It's planted with over 100 different flowering plants surrounded by native flowering shrubs. Every week during July and August you will see another set of flowers blooming. It includes two shaded benches near the street. Please visit! The main entrance is at the end of Sand Road opposite the Town Center Shopping Center. You can view the meadow by following Aarons Avenue around to Landis Mill Road. Spotlight on Borough Businesses

In 1959 a young British engineer, James Chant (now an 18-year Borough resident), immigrated to the United States with his wife and three sons to work in the then nascent space industry. In 1970 Jim started an engineering design and consulting business in the basement of his home. The business grew and in 1984 Jim's youngest son Philip (now President) joined the company as a full time employee.

In 1995 Chant Engineering moved into a 7000 square foot custom built industrial building in the Borough. With continuing growth the company now occupies a 50,000 sq. ft. "green design" energy efficient manufacturing facility, and has launched company-wide "green" initiatives to lower energy costs and eliminate harmful toxins from their work environment. The exterior walls and roof are highly insulated for energy conservation and a large solar panel array on the roof, together with high efficiency lighting, minimizes electricity consumption. Rainwater is captured for use in cleaning operations and landscape irrigation, and storm water is captured in rain gardens to minimize run-off.

Chant Engineering is a global, diversified engineering company that designs, manufactures, services and calibrates heavy duty testing machines and related equipment for worldwide industrial and military customers. The machinery uses hydraulics for generating very high forces, and uses electronics to provide precision control. One specialty is load testing ropes made of steel wire or synthetic materials to verify their strength, from a small machine pulling with a few pounds of force up to very large machines hundreds of feet long, able to pull up to 2,000 tons of force.

Another area of work is machines for testing hydraulic components to ensure they meet their specifications. These components are either newly made at a manufacturer's facility, or have been refurbished from repair shops, mostly on military bases. The company also designs and builds machinery for the plastics molding industry.

Protect our Streams and Waterways:

Summer is a critical time for our streams and waterways due to low flows which can create higher concentrations of pollutants in our streams. Thunderstorms and flash floods create high flows and contribute to washing pollutants such as grass clippings and chemicals into the streams. Grass clippings (especially for treated and / or fertilized yards) carry a high dosage of pollutants such as nitrates and phosphorus which can cause severe damage to downstream water quality along with the fish and invertebrates that live there.

Please be more eco-friendly this year to protect our environment. The pollutants in our streams have created a huge and expensive turn of events in finding ways to treat stormwater and how to pay for it. Many areas (Philadelphia) have created a 'stormwater' fee (tax) in order to help pay for the required treatment. Builders and developers have been paying portions of this expense for years in developing runoff treatment devices and paying for engineering and review of these systems.

Some of the things you can are as follows: don't fertilize your yard unless necessary, fertilize only 'as needed,' don't direct your grass clippings into the street (the grass clogs inlets and pipes, and you're throwing you fertilizer down the drain (literally)), dispose of branches, leaf litter and biodegradable trash by starting a compost pile (not near a stream that may flood), make sure any chemicals or hazardous substances are outside of the flooplain and areas that may wash chemicals into streams, dispose of pool backwash and water properly (and be sure chemical concentrations are below the legal limits), dispose of hazardous substances properly, add a rain garden or rain barrel to direct concentrated flows to (these relieve downstream flooding, provide increased water quality as well as provide a water source for irrigation during dry periods and reduce your water bill).

What *Not* to Put Down Your Sewer Drain *Fats, Oil, Grease...FOG*

Approximately 80% of grease-related sewer blockages and overflows occur in residential areas. FOG coats pipelines similar to the way fatty foods clog human arteries. The grease clings to the inside of the pipe, eventually building up and causing a complete blockage.

Grease Blockage Prevention

Preventing grease-related sewer blockages and overflows benefits your home, your pocketbook and the environment.

- Fat's, Oil's & Grease (FOG) should NEVER be poured down the sink. Sink drains and garbage disposals are not designed to properly handle these materials.
- Use sink strainers to catch food item, then empty the strainer into the trash.
- Before washing, scrape and dry wipe pots, pans and dishes with paper towels and dispose of materials in the trash.
- Pour FOG after it has cooled into a container, such as an empty milk cartoon or coffee can. Once the container is full, secure the lid and place it into the trash.
- Don't empty waste from a deep fryer down the drain. Allow the used oil to cool to room temperature and pour it into an empty bottle and put into the trash.

FATS

Fats typically come from meat and dairy sources but can also come from plant sources, such as nut butters. It is usually in a solid form at room temperature and can be thrown directly into the trash. Placing these foods in the garbage disposal only reduces the size of the food, not the likelihood of creating a clog. If you're not sure if something has fat in it, check the nutrition label. Examples are meat trimmings, uncooked poultry skin, cheeses, ice cream, peanut butter, butter, and shortening/lard.

OILS

Oil comes from plant sources such as vegetable oil, canola oil, olive oil, corn oil, etc. It may be used as a topping on food, such as salads or sandwiches or used to cook food, such as deep-frying. It remains liquid at room temperature. Used oil should be poured into a can or jar before disposal. If it is poured down the drain, oil can coat pipes and get into any nooks and crannies, creating a slick surface that makes it easier for fats and grease to stick to.

GREASE

Grease occurs when fats from food melt under heat such as frying, boiling and baking, etc. Grease is deceptive because it is a liquid after cooking, but eventually cools into a solid. Pouring it down the drain means that at some point it will cool on the pipes in the collection system, harden, and then start a clog. Examples are cooked and melted fat from meat, bacon, sausage, duck, etc., skin from boiled poultry, gravy and mayonnaise.

ber of residents who remember attending Camp years ago as well as those who have children attending now or in the recent past. Everyone remembers "Camp" as great experience. A big thanks to the Camp Staff and the office staff for all that they do to make our "Summer Camp" program a success.

Next, we have been working to update the Comprehensive Plan for the Borough and progress is being made, we expect to have a totally revised plan by the end of the year which will include "your" vision for the Butler Avenue corridor, it looks exciting.

Our Planning Commission is working with the Doylestown Township Planning Commission to make sure that both municipalities benefit from the development plans that are being reviewed for the area surrounding Delaware Valley College. This joint effort should bring good results in any development that occurs from current interests in that area of the Borough and Township.

If you haven't heard, the "Town Center" shopping center is up for sale. Federal Reality has put the property on the market and the Borough is very interested in working with developers interested in the center. We all know that the center looks "tired" and is in need of revitalization, we feel that by working together with potential new owners a New Town Center will emerge with good results for all involved.

Last but not least, I hope that everyone has a safe, enjoyable summer and that when it's over, you will remember the summer of 2014 as a great personal and family season.


