# Borough Hall name changed to Burkart Hall

On November 12, 2013 New Britain Borough Council renamed our Borough Hall to Burkart Hall. The Burkart Family has a long history in New Britain Borough as well as a history with our Borough Hall building. Edwin Burkart, a founding member of the Library and Literary Society, made a motion in 1912 to build a library and a place for the Literary Society to meet. This is the building that became our Borough Hall in 1969.

Edwin Burkart officiated at the laying of the building cornerstone on September 13, 1913. Louise Burkart, his wife, procured a donation of 63 books for lending.

The Burkart Orchestra, consisting of Edwin Burkart and his sons, Henry, Esher and Edwin Jr., played at many Library concerts; and both Edwin and Louise Burkart served on the Library board and participated in many of the programs held at the Library.

The next generation of Burkarts, Henry and Florence, also participated in many programs and appeared in several of the plays staged at the Library. Henry Burkart served his country in World War I.

The son of Henry and Florence, Bruce Burkart and his wife, Nancy, continued their family's tradition of service and citizenship through Nancy's tenure as Librarian, Bruce and Nancy's volunteer work at the Mercer Museum and Bucks County Meals on Wheels, as well as Bruce's service to his country during the Korean War, the many hours he spent repairing and maintaining the Library building before and after it was deeded to the Borough, his service as the Borough's first building inspector as an elected Borough tax collector for 24 years, on New Britain Borough Council, as Judge of Elections, and many other selfless acts of citizenship, including his current service as Borough Historian.

It is clear why Council wanted to honor Bruce and Nancy Burkart, as well as their ancestors, by renaming the building in their honor.



# Getting to Know Our Council Members

The Council of New Britain Borough is a body of seven elected officials who serve without compensation. The role of Council is to oversee all activities of the Borough, including the management of Borough employees. Council is responsible for making policy, passing ordinances, approving contracts and agreements, voting appropriations, approving all personnel decisions, and establishing and maintaining the Borough's budget. In this and future articles, we will interview our Borough Council members so that our residents and

businesses can get to know them. In this issue we will meet **Peter LaMontagne.** 

How long have you been on Council? Four years

Why did you decide to run for Council? Council was not meeting the needs of a modern municipality. Property values are lower in New Britain Borough than the rest of Central Bucks. We were 15 years behind adjoining municipalities in building Bike and Hike trails, and didn't even have a B&H plan for our Borough. As to open space, there were too few votes in favor of expanding the Nature Preserve using non taxpayer funds!

How long have you lived in the Borough? About 35 years

Are you married? Do you have children? I am married to Tess, my high school sweetheart and have three daughters, each smarter than the others.

What is your profession? I am a consulting engineer, specializing in centrifuges which thicken and dewater wastewater sludges throughout North America.

Any other volunteer activities other than Council? The Wilma Quinlan Nature Preserve. I feel passionate about the opportunity Dr Miriam Groner gave us to develop and expand the Nature Preserve to make it an asset of the Borough. To that end, I've gotten a lot of people interested in rescuing it from



decades of benign neglect. We are making great progress in making the Preserve attractive and user friendly.

I like to write and have published a lot of articles and papers for the Water and Environment Federation, the non profit trade association for the water and wastewater industry. For the Borough I re-wrote the open space plan, two PECO grants, and chaired the B&H committee that wrote the B&H plan. I was President of the New Britain Civic Association for many years

and continue helping out at the Covered Bridge Park.

**Do you have any hobbies?** Woodworking, from ball and claw furniture to the gazebo in the Park. I like to cook, and my wife and I travel all over the world.

What goals do you have for the Borough? I want the Borough to be more attractive to home buyers. In the last 50 years we've gone from a rural farming village to suburban, housing units in the Borough have tripled. What will happen in the next 50 years? I and maybe you will be gone then, but the Borough will remain. Number one priority is to use income from the endowment funds to expand the Wilma Quinlan Nature Preserve. It is a grand opportunity for the Borough to have an exceptional area for passive recreation at no cost to the taxpayer. Secondly, we need to improve the Butler Avenue corridor and tie Delaware College to the Business district with a Bike and Hike trail.

What would you like people to know about you? There is a lot of work that need volunteers to help. Some of that work is hands-on, other tasks require help with planning and organizing. We need more people to be active in the Borough, especially people that live up by the college, and south of Pine Run Elementary School. It is so rewarding to work with others to accomplish things. For myself, I believe nothing happens unless we think, plan, and work towards clearly defined goals.





### The Wilma Quinlan Nature Preserve


New Britain Borough owns the 28-acre Wilma Quinlan Nature Preserve, which has been open to the general public since its inception in 1972. The entrance is on Mathews Avenue near Sand Road. It is a lovely piece of land lying along the Neshaminy Creek, which covers many acres of wet lands, upland woods, and fields. Recently the Borough received three acres of land and a bequest for the Preserve, and has purchased an easement covering approximately 1.3 acres that connects the Preserve with 18 acres of Home Owner Open space across Cooks Run.

The Preserve has two distinct portions. One is a 1.5-acre wildflower meadow that was part of the property of Miriam Groner. The rest of the Preserve is uncultivated, except for the removal of invasive species where practical and some replacement with native plants. Footpaths are maintained so visitors can enjoy the Preserve and the wildlife.

With support from PECO through a generous grant that was matched by funds provided through the Bequest from Miriam Groner, volunteers and local businesses have partnered to make improvements to the Preserve. The result of this partnership has brought new signs to the Preserve and the Meadow that describe the wildlife and provide information about the Preserve. It has also allowed for benches to be obtained and placed throughout the Preserve and Meadow so visitors can sit and enjoy the wildlife. Landscaping around the benches and signs add to the beauty of the Preserve, and new birdhouses provide homes for the numerous bird species that call the Preserve home.

### Austin C. Brown Jr., longtime Borough resident and **Police Chief**

Died on Sunday, Dec. 29, 2013, at his home. He was 91.

Austin Brown was the devoted husband of 53 years to the late Laura Mae Brown and father to the late David Austin Brown. He is survived by his daughter, Shirley Jean Brown of New Britain. Born in Philadelphia, he was the son of the late Austin C. Brown Sr. and Lillian Vanderslice Brown.

Mr. Brown was a graduate of Doylestown High School, Class of 1941. He built his house on Butler Avenue in the late 1940's where he lived until his death.

He was a proud veteran of the United States Navy during World War II. After returning home from the war, he worked for several years as a carpenter before joining the New Britain Borough police force, where he served as a patrolman for eight years before being elevated to chief of police, serving faithfully for 19 years. After retiring as chief, he continued to work for the Borough as a building inspector, and a plumbing inspector. He also served as fire marshall.

Mr. Brown was very active in various professional and community activities. He was a member of the Doylestown Lodge #245, the Consistory in Allentown, the American Legion, the Chalfont Fire Co., the Pa. Chiefs of Police Association, the F.O.P., and the Bucks County Chiefs of Police Association, where he had served as president in 1977. He was also a member of the New Britain Borough Council for six years and a Shriner at Lulu Temple, Plymouth Township.

Austin, or Brownie, as many affectionately called him, dedicated much of his life to our community. He will be missed by all who knew him.

#### Stormwater

#### Stream Protection:

While you're keeping warm cleaning out your basement remember to dispose of hazardous materials such as oil, paint, medications, etc. to a hazardous waste drop off; never flush or dump. Maintain your vehicle by checking and repairing oil / antifreeze leaks. Any illegal dumping or drainage activities should be reported immediately to New Britain Borough. If you notice any signs of stream pollution or have any questions contact the Borough at 215-348-4586.

#### Rainwater Runoff:

Now is a good time to consider Spring projects such as installing rain barrels on your downspouts, lowered planting beds (rain garden), connecting roof drains to stone pits, etc. in order to reduce runoff and aid water quality for your downstream neighbors. These methods will help provide ground water infiltration, increase stream base flows, reduce droughts and decrease flooding.

#### Construction:

Stormwater controls are required for most additions of impervious surfaces which may require permits. Please check with the Borough office to determine if permits are required.
