New Britain Borough - Rich in History

The township of New Britain was originally among the largest and most important within Bucks County. It bor-


dered on the Montgomery County line and was about 6-1/2 miles long and 4-1/2 miles wide. The creation of Doylestown in 1819 and Warrington in 1849 greatly reduced the township's size. The land of New Britain was well watered and heavily timbered, the soil fertile and easily cultivated, the scenery beautiful and the surface rolling.

In what is now the eastern corner of the township, the Mathews family first took up its abode. The land afterward owned by them embraced at one time the land between Pine Run and the several branches of the Neshaminy Creek and the land stretching from the present village of Chalfont to New Britain.

The earliest mention of the purchase of the land by Europeans was that of an English company formed in London in 1682 by the name of the "Free Society of Traders," which purchased a large tract in

New Britain (including parcels in Doylestown and Warrington). As this tract was first purchased from "The Society," our New Britain was first called "Society."

Simon Mathews, from Pembrokeshire, Wales, and Simon Butler, his brother-in-law were the first settlers on the tract in about 1680. Butler was a miller and he and Mathews erected a mill at the junction of Pine Run and the North Branch of the Neshaminy. It was called "Butler's Mill," and gave rise to the naming of the present Route 202 as Butler Avenue. The mill stood across the street from Simon Butler's home, which is now R.L.Showalter and Associates on Butler Avenue at the bridge entering Chalfont from the east.



most of whom died in infancy or of consumption.

The Baptist Church was organized in 1754. Its members were mostly Welsh. The first pastor was Joseph Eaton. The oldest marked grave is that of John Riale, who died on August 10, 1748.

Beulah Cemetery was started in 1882. In 1857 the Reading Railroad opened a branch between Lansdale and Doylestown, and New Britain has had a train station ever since.

The store property standing on the southwest corner of Tamenend and Butler Avenue was built in 1760. One of the last proprietors was Paul VanToor. He served as Postmaster for 43 years, having been appointed in 1897 by President William McKinley. He had the store for more than 50 years and ended his postmaster career on January 31, 1940. Council approves 2000 budget


Borough Council approved a 2000 budget of \$894,220. Total anticipated revenue is \$705,432. In addition there is a Road Fund balance of \$52,200 and a cash reserve of \$200,000.

The 27-mill Borough tax is comprised of:

In addition, a 3-mill Fire Protection Tax provides funds for the two fire companies that serve the Borough, Doylestown and Chalfont.

Historical records indicate that on June 20, 1778, George Washington and the Continental Army camped near the present railroad station. Dr. Samuel Adams, a surgeon on his staff, wrote a letter to his "Dear Sally" from New Britain. The continental Army was enroute from Valley Forge pursuing the British who had evacuated Philadelphia and were retreating to New York. Washington used New Hope and Lambertville crossing the Delaware. After reaching anew Jersey, Washington learned that the British were headed for Sandy Hook instead of Perth Amboy, so he turned south and caught them at Monmouth. In the ensuing battle, the Royal Welsh Fusiliers were severely decimated.

New Britain Borough was incorporated on May 21, 1928.


