David Holewinski appointed Mayor following death of Robert Snavely

New Britain Council named David Holewinski acting mayor after the resignation and subsequent death of long-time Borough Mayor Robert Snavely. Mayor Snavely passed away surrounded by his family on February 20. He served as Mayor for 22 years and was a Council member for 20 years prior. "Bob will be sorely missed," commented Borough Manager Robin Trymbiski. "He helped us through tremendous changes over the years."

Holewinski comes to this position with 26 years of community involvement. He has served on the Borough Planning Commission since 1992, the last several years as Chair. He has been on the board of the New Britain Civic Association since 1982, presently serving as president.

Holewinski worked as advertising manager for Philadelphia Newspapers Inc. for 15 years, and currently is Vice President of Sales/Marketing for Covered Bridge Media, Inc. In addition, he also serves as the New Britain Borough representative on the Tri-Municipal Master Trail and Greenway Planning group.

Holewinski's appointed term expires at the end of 2009. He has filed for candidacy for the mayoral position in the November 2009 election.



2009 Borough Budget


The pie charts provide an overview of the Borough's projected income and expenses, but they don't show the whole picture. For instance projected income from real estate taxes and permits are down this year by some 45% — a sign of the current economic woes. But expenses like health insurance and police presence keep going up. We have and continue to use

some of our reserve funds to offset increasing expenses, but those funds have been greatly reduced, as has the income from them. Therefore the Council found it necessary to increase the Borough tax by 6 mills this year. We take seriously our commitment to the Borough residents to provide for their safety while controlling expenses to the best of our ability.

Proposed School Bus Depot

As many of you undoubtedly know, the Central Bucks School District has applied for Conditional Use approval under our Zoning Ordinance to relocate one of their school bus depots to the old Cayuga Concrete site at Route 202 and Bristol Road. Borough Council conducted a series of hearings through February on the application, where the School District, the Borough and Borough residents had an opportunity to present evidence and argument. Now that the hearings have concluded, the parties are preparing proposed findings, and thereafter Borough Council will render a written decision after a public vote.





Managing Stormwater

You can protect our streams

Rainwater picks up debris and pollutants as it travels toward streams. Limiting use of herbicides and fertilizers and disposing of hazardous materials properly to hazardous waste drop offs (see article to right) helps to keep our streams clean. Store any hazardous materials in safe places and dispose of old unused materials properly.





or spill any materials onto your driveway or roadway that could enter the storm collection system and pollute our streams.

POOL WATER DISCHARGE: Pool owners are required to discharge water responsibly per Borough and PADEP rules and regulations. The Clean Stream Law prohibits the discharge of chemically treated water into streams or storm sewers. Contaminated pool water can quickly make its way to streams where aquatic life is damaged or killed. Property owners and pool companies that violate these laws are subject to prosecution and penalties for damages. Pool owners and pool cleaners need to dispose of old water correctly, and to neutralize wastewaters containing chemicals such as chlorine and muriatic acid. Chlorine will dissipate in 5-7 days so the simplest solution is to wait a week before discharging the water to a grassy area. Filter backwash should also be discharged to a grassy area and never to a street, pond or stream. Pool cleaning wastewater containing muriatic acid (aka hydrochloric acid) must always be neutralized before discharge.

Any illegal dumping or drainage activities should be reported immediately to New Britain Borough at 215-348-4586. Feel free to call the Borough with any questions.

Safely dispose of household hazardous waste

Household products containing toxic chemicals, like pesticides, oil-based paints, solvents, cleaning products, weed killers and automotive batteries can be a threat to people and the environment if improperly discarded. Never throw these materials into the trash, as the toxic chemicals may harm sanitation workers, or result in fires in collection vehicles. It is also not safe to pour them into a sink or storm drain as they can end up in the environment polluting our air, water, or soil.

Bucks County's Hazardous Waste Collection program provides an opportunity for residents to safely dispose of household hazardous waste. Out of nearly 1000 households in the Borough only 30 took advantage of this disposal option last year. Let's try to improve upon that this year.

There are six drop off locations; the three closest to the Borough are:

June 20, 2009, Upper Bucks County Area Vo-Tech School 3115 Ridge Road – Bedminster Township

July 18, 2009, *Middle Bucks Institute of Technology,* 2740 Old York Road (Route 263) – Warwick Twp.

September 26, 2009, *Quakertown Community Pool*, Mill Street – Quakertown Borough

What can you bring?

As many as three old computers and up to 25 gallons or 220 pounds of hazardous products. Hazardous products will have cautionary words on the label; for example: Danger, Warning, or Caution. Other words that can signal hazardous products include: poisonous, hazardous, combustible ,flammable, corrosive, volatile, caustic, irritant, explosive, toxic, use withadequate ventilation, or avoid inhaling. If there are no words indicating it is a hazardous product, it likely isn't.

Common household items being collected include **caustics** such as oven cleaner and ammonia-based cleaners; **batteries** including rechargeable and button type as well as automotive; **pesticides**; **toxics** such as weed killer, pool and photographic chemicals, rust remover and wood preservatives; **flammables** such as oil-based paints, varnishes, gasoline. DO NOT BRING latex paint, appliances, asbestos, explosives or tires.
