# Summer Recreation Program

The time has come again to think about summer activities. This year, as in the past, the Borough will sponsor a five-week program at Covered Bridge Park. The camp will operate daily Monday to Friday, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. from June 26 to July 28, 1995.

A new director, Anne Oldfield, and arts and crafts counselor, Elaine Hines, will join with several returnees to supervise daily programs that will include arts and crafts, special events and numerous sports activities. Children ages six through twelve years are eligible to participate. No groups from day-care or

babysitting services will be accepted.

The registration fee for the 5-week program will be \$60 for the first child and \$55 for each additional child. If the family is not a resident of New Britain Borough, the fee will be \$75 for the first child and \$70 for each additional child.

Registration will take place at the Park on Monday, June 26 beginning at 9 a.m. All checks should be made payable to New Britain Borough.

A large turnout is anticipated, so be sure that your kids are among the lucky participants.

## Road Work Planned for 1995 Season

The following roadway projects are scheduled for construction during the summer and fall of 1995:


- Reconstruction (using the cold, in-place recycling method) of North Shady Retreat Road from Butler Ave. (Route 202) to Iron Hill Road.
- Micro-surfacing (using Ralimac) on Britain Drive in the industrial area.
- Widening of Sioux Road between Keeley Avenue and North Tamanend Avenue.
- Install handicapped ramps throughout Briarwood (at all intersections) and several locations on Maple Lane.

- Crack sealing on various streets throughout the Borough.
- Participation with Doylestown Township on the reconstruction of the intersection of Route 202 and New Britain Road.
- Repainting of all traffic lines throughout the Borough.


## 1995 Budget

The 1995 New Britain Borough budget has been approved and expenditures will total \$714,000. The real estate tax remains at 12 mills. There is a special 3-mill road tax.



A separate 3-mill Fire Protection Tax provides funds for the two fire companies serving the Borough.

Borough income is derived from property taxes, earned income tax, and real estate transfer taxes.



## Youth Aid Panel Members Needed

The New Britain Borough Police Department is looking for volunteeres to serve as members of its Youth Aid Panel. The Panel is a juvenile diversion program for first-time non-violent youthful offenders to keep them from going through the County Juvenile Court system.

## The New Britain Store


"In the olden time, even more than at present, the village store in rural neighborhoods was not only an indispensable convenience, but prized as the center of local news, and the paradise of loafers. Seated on chairs, benches, boxes and barrels the choicest tid-bits of gossip were exchanged, especially by the boys and men folks. The local merchant tolerated all this with equanimity, as part of the incidents of his occupation. He really was interested in some of this gossip himself; he knew personally all these loafers, and they were his customers and all respectable people. There were then no daily papers from the city to bring the news of the wide world. Ofttimes the talk took a higher range. It reached into state and

national politics. It was interwoven with historical reminiscence of the past and sometimes ventured into church matters and themes of theological discussion. Such were the characteristics of New Britain store in past times."

The stone building with frame addition on the Southeast corner of Route 202 and Tamanend Avenue played important roles in the life of early New Britain residents. It is situated on part of a tract of land bought by Thomas James of Kirkbride, England in 1731. The present building was probably preceded by an earlier house built around 1760. The house was rebuilt to its present state in 1845 and the frame section added. The owner of record at that time was Silas Kroner who was a shoemaker. The building housed his shop until it was turned into a general store in about 1857. According to records, the Kroner store was "a notable rendezvous of neighborhood

gossippers." A post office was established here about the same time. The property changed hands many times but remained a store and post office for many years. More recently the building housed a kindergarten. Today this historic structure continues its usefulness by providing professional office space.



## Ordinance Review


### Grass & Weeds

This Borough ordinance requires that grass and weeds must be cut or trimmed so that they do not exceed 8" in height. The purpose is not only to keep the community aesthetically pleasing, but to protect residents from possible health risks associated with overgrowth.
