Attention Borough Residents . . .

Have you ever driven down a Borough street and noticed a street sign or stop sign is missing or damaged? Over the years this has occurred on a number of occasions. Contractors Required to Provide Proof of Workers' Compensation

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania enacted Act 44 on August 31, 1993, which requires that a certificate of Workers' Compensation Insurance be submitted along with all building permit applications submitted by municipalities.

Contractors applying for a building permit in New Britain Borough must, along with all other permit requirements, provide a copy of their Workers' Compensation Insurance Certificate naming New Britain Borough as a certificate holder.

EXEMPTIONS:

- 1. Contractor has no employees and all work performed under the building permit will be performed by the contractor.
- 2. Contractor has a religious exemption under the Workers' Compensation Law.

If the applicant is the property owner and all work under the permit is to be performed by the property owner, proof of Workers' Compensation is not needed. However, if any contractor is subsequently hired to perform work under the building permit, that contractor must immediately furnish proof of Workers' Compensation Insurance to the Borough. If a certificate is not provided, a Stop Work Order will be issued by the Borough Zoning Officer as this would be a clear violation of state law.

A copy of the portion of Act 44 pertaining to building permit applications is available at the Borough office, 45 Keeley Avenue.


1994 Budget

The 1994 New Britain Borough budget has been approved and calls for expenditures totaling \$658,000.

The General Real Estate tax remains at 12 mills. In addition, there is a special 3-mill Road Tax. The Road Tax was necessary in order to build up funds for much needed road resurfacing.

A separate 3-mill Fire Protection Tax provides operating funds for the two fire companies which

service the Borough, Chalfont and Doylestown.




Borough income is derived from property taxes, the earned income tax, and real estate transfer taxes.

The Hendricks-Fisher House

The Hendricks-Fisher House, located on the corner of Route 202 and Tamenend Avenue, was recently added to the Bucks County Conservancy Register of Historic Places. This handsome town dwelling was built in 1848 by Albert G. Hendricks, a blacksmith.

The structure is an early eclectic Victorian and is distinctive in its combination of the Greek



Revival and Italianate styles. Of particular note is the bracketed porch with its eight-sided columns. The gabled roof is trimmed with a bracketed box cornice, and the windows contain original glass throughout.

During the last three ownerships of the house, strange things have occurred which begot rumors that the house is haunted by a mischievous spirit. Stories include windows and doors opening and closing by themselves and organ music heard coming from below a trap door in the den. A sudden aroma of ham and cabbage in the house was experienced by both the current owners, Douglas and Donna Fisher, and a previous owner. The Fisher's say the strange occurrences seemed to stop a few months after they moved in.
