


Veterans Day Flag Raising Ceremony

New Britain Borough celebrates 75 years

As we celebrate the 75th anniversary of the incorporation of New Britain Borough, here is some interesting information from the "early" days.

The first Council meeting was held on June 22, 1928, and for the first 6 months, two meetings were held each month.

In December, Council passed Ordinance #2, which gave the Bell Telephone Company certain rights to do business in the borough. Burgess Miller vetoed the ordinance, but Council overrode his veto by a vote of 6 to 0. (We now have a Mayor instead of a Burgess.)

Wynne James, Jr. approached Council asking to annex into the Borough the Wynne James subdivision of James Manor and Vauxtown. James Manor runs from Shady Retreat Road to Iron Hill Road. Vauxtown runs from Iron Hill Road to New Britain Road.

Changes to street names were proposed: Almshouse Road would become Tamenend Avenue; Railroad Avenue would be renamed Mathews Avenue; Water Street would become Aarons Avenue; State Highway would be named Butler Avenue.

Ordinance #3, approved in February 1929, annex lands of Doylestown Township into the Borough. These lands were James Manor and Vauxtown.

On May 11, 1929, Council passed the first tax for property owners at a rate of 13 mills.

Also in May, Council voted to hold their meetings in the New Britain Library Building (now the Borough Hall). They would pay \$1.50 for Tuesday meetings; \$2 for any other night.





Halloween Safety

It's that time again when children enjoy dressing up and roaming the neighborhoods in search of some of their favorite candy. Here are some things we can do to help make this Halloween safer for everyone:



1. LIGHTING:

- a. Make sure the pathway to your home is well lit. If you are using candles to light the way, make sure they are a safe distance from the sidewalk or driveway. Some children wear items made of paper or carry paper bags.
- b. If you are going to use the "dark" affect, make sure there are no tripping hazards in the way.

2. CLOTHING:

- a. Use clothing or a costume that allows others to see your child from a safe distance. It's not uncommon for some children to ride their bikes, roller blades, or skateboards from house to house. Some children can travel at high speeds on these things and before you know it, they can be right on top of you.
- b. Avoid using paper costumes. More and more people are lighting their pathways with small candles. These often invite a curious child in for a closer look.

3. CANDY:

- a. Talk with your children about not eating candy before they get home. Inspect the candy before they eat it. If you are not going out trick or treating with your child, buy them some of their favorite candy to eat along the way.
- b. Make sure you inspect "all" the candy. Anything that looks like it was tampered with should be thrown out. It's best to error on the safe side.

4. GROUPS:

- a. Make sure your child walks or rides around with other children and "never" alone.
- b. Children should be told not to approach any "vehicle" or stranger during the evening. We use the word vehicle because some children will think it's OK to go up to a van or bus if you tell them to stay away from all "cars".

Will you answer the call?

Our volunteer Fire and Emergency Medical Services departments are committed to answering the call each and everyday. We need your support to ensure that we have the emergency service equipment and personnel to protect you and your family.

Chalfont Emergency Medical Services and Chalfont Fire Company appeared before the New Britain Borough Council on July 8, 2003 to request a pair of referenda for the November 4th ballot.

In this year's November election, voters will decide whether to initiate an ambulance tax of 2 mills. This will be the first tax for the community for the Chalfont Emergency Medical Services. It is necessary because of the tremendous advancement in emergency medicine and the cost of this life saving equipment and personnel.

The cost to the average Borough resident will be less than 5 cents a day, less than \$15 a year and would generate the income for our immediate costs and drewate a fund for capital equipment.

The Fire Company is asking for an increase of 2 mills to its current 3 mills, which would insure the purchase of new apparatus. Show your support for your local Ambulance and Fire personnel. Vote YES for both referenda on November 4th

Our beautiful autumn weather will inevitably give way to winter weather Here are some of your responsibilities during snow events:

Sidewalks must be cleared of ice and snow by at least 12 hours after snow stops falling. You may want to wait to shovel your driveway apron until after the snow plow comes through.

If there is a fire hydrant on or near your property, please make sure it is cleared of snow and ice.

Parking is prohibited on all Borough streets during and after snow falls until the roads have been cleared. When snow is predicted, please do not park your car on the road. Do not interfer with snow plows.
